



CPS Investigation Process

- To determine whether an alleged incident of child abuse or neglect has occurred and whether there is risk of future abuse or neglect.
- To ensure the safety of children at risk of harm either through immediate removal from dangerous situations or through family-based services to enable the family to protect the child.

CPS Investigation Steps



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1. Receive Abuse/Neglect Reports

Process

- Statewide Intake (SWI) receives reports 24/7
- Determines if reports meet statutory definitions of abuse/neglect
- Assigns priority
 - ➤ Priority 1 within 24 Hours
 - ➤ Priority 2 within 10 Days

2. Assign Reports for Investigation

Process

- SWI forwards all reports to local law enforcement
- SWI electronically sends abuse/neglect reports to local CPS office
- Priority 1 reports assigned to staff available around the clock
- Some regions perform additional screening to identify cases needing full investigation
- Joint investigations with law enforcement on priority 1 physical and sexual abuse

3. Ensure Child Safety

Process

- Child safety is the highest priority
- Continuous assessment of child safety
 - > During each contact with child and family
 - ➤ Whenever new information is received
- If child is not safe, a safety plan is immediately put in place and monitored, including actions needed to protect the child, such as:
 - > Supervise contact between child and alleged perpetrator
 - Bar alleged perpetrator from home
 - Place child with relatives
 - Place child in foster care

4. Investigate and Assess Reports

Process

- Initial contact within 24 hours or 10 days
- Interview all alleged victims to ensure they are safe
- Gather information from children, parents, relatives, and others who know the family
- Abuse/neglect background checks on parents and alleged perpetrators
- Criminal background checks on all alleged perpetrators

5. Determine Abuse/Neglect Findings

Process

- Based on all interviews and information gathered during the investigation, the worker:
 - Determines whether the child was abused or neglected
 - Assesses the likelihood of future abuse or neglect

6. Conclude the Investigation

Process

- With supervisor approval, one of the following actions takes place:
 - Case Closed No services needed or family referred to community-based services
 - ➤ Case Opened Family-Based Safety Services are provided for children at risk but who are safe in their homes
 - Case Opened Child
 Placement Services are
 provided for children who are
 removed when they are not
 safe in their homes.
