What is Human Trafficking?

Human Trafficking (HT) is a violent crime and a serious violation of human rights.

Types of HT:

- Forced labor, and
- Sexual exploitation





HT can affect anyone:

- Children and adults,
- Women and men,
- Any race,
- Any socioeconomic status, and
- Any educational level.

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Research shows the following are especially vulnerable to HT exploitation:

- Youth with complex trauma,
- Youth with child welfare histories,
- Current and transitioning foster youth, and
- Youth who run from foster care.



Texas Family Code §261.001(1)(g)

Texas Family Code §261.001(1)(I)

knowingly causing, permitting, encouraging, engaging in, or allowing a child to be trafficked in a manner punishable as an offense under Section 20A.02(a)(5), (6), (7), or (8), Penal Code, or the failure to make a reasonable effort to prevent a child from being trafficked in a manner punishable as an offense under any of those sections.

Identification and Recovery

- Investigations of Familial Trafficking
- Maximize expertise of Special Investigators
- Training all staff
- Developed HT Response Protocol
- HTCE coordination with all stages of service for improved outcomes





DFPS must be able to identify when HT or risk of HT exists.

When youth are recovered from missing or runaway events, DFPS must assess if an incident of HT occurred during their absence.

- Not every missing child is exploited.
- Not every child who is a victim of sex trafficking has had a missing episode.
- Not every child victim of sex trafficking will be in CPS Conservatorship.
- Most victims do not readily self-identify.





When a child is in CPS conservatorship and is missing, it is extremely important that the agency put forth every effort to quickly locate the child.

DFPS HT Response Protocol

The HT Protocol supports:

- 1. Preventing Sex Trafficking and Families Act 2014
- 2. Victim Identification
- 3. Service Planning
- 4. Collaboration





HT Response Protocol

The HT Protocol outlines the agency's expected response in three critical areas:

- 1. Human Trafficking Investigations
- 2. Youth at Risk
- 3. Youth at High Risk





HT Response Protocol: Youth at Risk

Youth at Risk are defined as youth 12 years or older, in DFPS conservatorship who have had five or more placements.





YOUTH AT HIGH RISK FOR HUMAN TRAFFICKING




Children in DFPS conservatorship, who are missing, or on runaway status.



Commercial Sexual Exploitation-Identification Tool (CSE-IT)

- Aids in detecting indicators of sexual exploitation.
- Designed to ensure earlier identification of sex trafficking, and protect youth from prolonged abuse and violence.
- An integration tool
- ≠ Not a diagnostic tool, or
- ≠ Not a structured interview with a youth.





Commercial Sexual Exploitation-Identification Tool (CSE-IT):


The completed CSE-IT results in a total number that indicates the youth's **level of human trafficking indicators** as:

- No Concern,
- Possible Concern, or
- Clear Concern.





DFPS HT Response Protocol





IMPACT Modernization 2.0 will improve data

- Suspected and confirmed HT victims, and
- Missing and runaway youth.

Services

Assess and expand Continuum of Care for youth in Foster Care.

- Coordinated Care Teams
- Human Trafficking Advocate Agencies
- HT Summit in Houston
- DFPS led Administration for Children and Families Region VI Human Trafficking Workgroup





Care Coordination Teams (CCT)

Established by the Office of the Texas Governor-Child Sex Trafficking Team (CSTT) across the state to provide youth victims of sex trafficking with a continuum of care.





HT Advocate Agencies (HTAA)

Provide Child Sex Trafficking Advocates that are specifically trained to offer a variety of services that may include:

- Crisis intervention,
- Ongoing case management, and
- Healthy, supportive long-term relationships for survivors.




HT Support Systems

Recovery Meetings for Confirmed Victims

Established after DFPS learns that a youth is missing or has run away from care who is a confirmed victim of

trafficking.





Trafficking Allegations for Fiscal Year 2017

Allegations of sex trafficking reported to Statewide Intake's child abuse hotline increased by 181 percent from 248 in fiscal year 2016 to 697 in fiscal year 2017 (see **Table 1**).

Allegation	FY2016	FY2017
Sex Trafficking	248	697
Labor Trafficking	45	47



HT Statistics

The number of these allegations that led to a disposition of "Reason to Believe" rose from 23 in fiscal year 2016 to 40 in fiscal year 2017 (see **Table 2**).

Allegation	FY2016	FY2017
Sex Trafficking	23	40
Labor Trafficking	< 5	< 5



HT and Runaways Statistics

Sixty-two* children and youth reported being victimized while they were on run away status in fiscal year 2017, with some experiencing multiple types of victimization (see **Table 7**).

- ✓ Status for Bexar, Dallas, Harris, Tarrant and Travis Counties.
 - Train the Trainer has been completed
 - In February, training will be completed with staff designated to execute the CSE-IT.
 - First ever Memorandum of Understanding for human trafficking advocate services executed with more to follow.

January National Human Trafficking Month:


- Human Trafficking Division collaborated with Community Engagement Specialists and our Faith-Based Specialists around the state to partner with the community on events.
